

Direction of travel


Approach and Beyond

- Know what APPROACH and BEYOND mean
- Know where you are in relation to a fixed point (normally a signal)
- Know that fixed point's relationship to the traffic direction
- Be able to give information and receive instruction



I am standing **beyond** the signal






Staying alert and staying safe as a Lookout

- When acting as a Lookout make sure you know your safe place to stand
- Make sure your mobile is switched off
- Stay alert and carefully watch for approaching trains
- Be aware of your surroundings and don't put yourself in danger







- Communicate clearly
- Follow instructions
- Keep focused and don't distract other team members
- Report anything unsafe



Emergency call procedure

- Stay calm, speak clearly and be specific
- Give your name
- Give your job title
- Name your employer
- Specify your exact location
- Specify your telephone or radio call number
- Give details of the accident / incident
- Identify which lines are definitely blocked and which lines could be blocked
- State which emergency services are needed



Letter code word














Understanding and checking Sentinel Cards


- Recognise what a card looks like

- Remember Care First, we all have times when we need to talk to somebody 0800 174 319








Going on or near the line

- Be engaging
- Listen, encourage and respond to questions
- Make sure people understand and have all the information they need to carry out the work safely
- Check the group's understanding by asking them questions about the briefing
